Hope Valley Address Markers Are Available!

At long last Hope Valley Address Markers are in the final stages of fabrication and will be delivered soon to residents who ordered them. The HVNA has authorized Vega Metals to produce a few extra sets for quick delivery this fall. The Address Markers, with highly reflective street numbers, were designed to honor Hope Valley's historic street signs, which were created, it is thought by George Watts Carr in collaboration with Aymar Embury II.


Residents may order these unique and highly functional markers via hvna.org or by mailing a check to HVNA Address Marker, PO Box 51338, Durham,

NC 27717. Markers come with bracket and number sign for \$200, or as a kit which includes a rustic cedar post, lag bolts, and washers for \$230. Be sure to indicate the address numbers you want on your marker.

Act now there are a limited number of markers available in this fabrication run. There are no current plans for another run in the near future.



Hope Valley Burglaries - 2014 through October, 2016 -



By all accounts, 2015 was a disastrous year for burglaries in our neighborhood, with eight burglaries in the month of January, followed by 22 more burglaries in the next 11 months. The burglary total of 30 was the all time high number of burglaries since we have beend keeping detail property crime statistics eight years ago; and January marked the highest number of burglaries that we have ever experienced in a single month.

Except for one month, 2016 stands in stark contrast to 2015. Through October this year, there have been 14 burglaries in Hope Valley. This, in spite of a spike of six burglaries in the month of August. So far, we have had four months with no burlgaries. If fact, we have not had any burglaries since the six in August.

Determining precisely why burglary rates increase or decrease in our neighborhood is difficult. However, investigations and subsequent arrest of burglary suspects by our friends at the Durham Police Department undoubtedly had an effect. Also, neighbors watching their neighbors' property and calling 911 when they see anything suspicious has also sends the message to potential burglars that Hope Valley residents are not easy pickings.

The Historic Windsor Gates - Hope Valley History By Don Stanger

In 1926 the concept of a rustic development situated between Durham and Chapel Hill began to take shape. Early on, three well known architects were engaged to design key elements of the new concept: the golf course — Donald Ross, the land-scape — Robert Cridland, and the club house — Aymar Embury II.

In addition to designing the now historic HVCC club house in 1927, Embury designed the iconic gates that adorn the intersection of Windsor Way and Old Chapel Hill Road.

By the time he became involved with the Hope Valley project, Embury had already achieved some renown as an artist and designer.

A graduate of Princeton University with a degree in Civil Engineering, Embury served as a U.S. Army Captain in World War I. During his Army service, he established the Army Artist program, which documented WW I events through paintings. Following

the war, he was commissioned to design medals for recognition of WW I heroes. He designed the Distinguished Service Medal and Distinguished Service Cross (awarded to early Hope Valley resident, Lt. Hubert Teer for his heroic acts in France).



In the 1934 New York Mayor Fiorello La Guardia appointed Robert Moses as sole commissioner of a newly unified Department of Parks for New York City, commencing a seven-year period of construction and renovation of city parks. As Moses' principal architect, Embury designed many notable projects, including the Central Park Zoo, Prospect Park Zoo, Prospect Park Bandshell, McCarren Park and four of the other ten WPA pools built throughout the city in the mid-1930s, the New York City Building at the 1939 New York World's Fair (the first meeting place of the United Nations and currently the Queens Museum of Art), Triborough Bridge, Henry Hudson Bridge, Orchard Beach, Bryant Park, the Hofstra University Campus, and Jacob Riis Park.
